RESOLUTION NO. 2023-149

A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR A PUBLIC HEARING TO HEAR PUBLIC INPUT ON ACCEPTING ROADS, AS DESCRIBED HERIN, TO BE A PUBLIC ROAD

WHEREAS, the statutes of the State of Montana vest in the Board of County Commissioners with authority and responsibility regarding roads and bridges, and such statutes are generally found in Montana Code Annotated Title 7, Chapter 14, and;

WHEREAS, the Roosevelt County Commissioners are aware that the following roads exists in Roosevelt County known as **Road 2054, Road 1030, Road 1032, Road 2050, and Road 1036** which are more specifically described as follows:

Width of Right of Way is a strip of land 60 feet in width, lying 30 feet on each side of the centerline as currently constructed. If additional area is needed for grading and maintenance, it will be addressed on a per case basis.

Road 2054 – T29N R54E Section 31, 32, 33 and 34 AND T28N R54E Section 1, 2, 3 and 4

BEGINNING AT A POINT ON THE CENTER OF A BRIDGE STRUCTURE KNOWN AS THE MUDDY SLAB, SAID POINT BEING ON THE BOUNDARY LINE OF THE FORT PECK INDIAN RESERVATION; THENCE SOUTHWESTERLY ALONG A CURVE APPROXIMATELY 150 FEET TO A POINT ON THE TOWNSHIP LINE COMMON TO TOWNSHIP 29 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM AND TOWNSHIP 28 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM, SAID POINT BEING APPROXIMATELY 640 FEET EAST OF THE SOUTH SECTION CORNER COMMON TO SECTIONS 33 AND 34, TOWNSHIP 29 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM; THENCE ALONG SAID TOWNSHIP LINE APPROXIMATELY 2.35 MILES TO THE NORTH SECTION CORNER COMMON TO SECTIONS 3 AND 4, TOWNSHIP 28 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM; THENCE WEST-NORTHWEST APPROXIMATELY 400 FEET; THENCE WEST-SOUTHWEST APPROXIMATELY 600 FEET; THENCE NORTHWESTERLY ALONG A CURVE APPROXIMATELY 500 FEET; THENCE WESTERLY ALONG A CURVE APPROXIMATELY 400 FEET TO A POINT OF TERMINATION, SAID POINT BEING APPROXIMATELY 450 FEET NORTH AND APPROXIMATELY 100 FEET EAST OF THE SOUTH QUARTER CORNER OF SECTION 31, TOWNSHIP 29 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM.

Road 1030 – T28N R54E Section 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 23 and 24

BEGINNING AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROAD 1030 WITH ROAD 2054 AT A POINT ON THE NORTH LINE OF TOWNSHIP 28 NORTH, RANGE 54 EAST, MPM, SAID POINT BEING THE SECTION CORNER COMMON TO SECTIONS 1 AND 2; THENCE SOUTH ALONG THE SECTION LINES COMMON TO SAID SECTIONS 1 AND 2, SECTIONS 11 AND 12, SECTIONS 13 AND 14 AND SECTIONS 23 AND 24 APPROXIMATELY 3.48 MILES TO A POINT OF INTERSECTION WITH HIGHWAY 2.

Road 1036 – T29N R53E Section 9, 15 and 16

BEGINNING AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROAD 1036 WITH ROAD 2050 AT THE SECTION CORNER COMMON TO SECTIONS 9, 10, 15 AND 16, TOWNSHIP 29 NORTH, RANGE 53 EAST, MPM; THENCE SOUTH ALONG THE SECTION LINE COMMON TO SAID SECTIONS 15 AND 16 APPROXIMATELY 4,900 FEET TO A POINT OF TERMINATION, SAID POINT BEING APPROXIMATELY 400 FEET NORTH OF THE SECTION CORNER COMMON TO SECTIONS 15, 16, 21 AND 22, TOWNSHIP 29 NORTH, RANGE 53 EAST, MPM.

THIS RIGHT OF WAY INCLUDES ADDITIONAL WIDTH, AS NECESSARY, TO ACCOMMODATE A LARGE Y JUNCTION AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROADS 1036 AND ROAD 2050.

WHEREAS, the Roosevelt County Commissioners are aware that on some portions of the foregoing described roads that petitions, grants, easements or resolutions may have been filed in the past, and as consequence, these portions appear to have been declared County Roads. However, some portions appear not to have been previously the subject of road petitions; and

WHEREAS, the foregoing road has been laid out, constructed, and maintained with state or county funds, and it appears that persons using such road have long been under the belief that the entire length of such road is a county road; and

WHEREAS, the Montana Code Annotated 7-14-2101 states: (2) (a), following a public hearing, a board of county commissioners may accept by resolution a road that has not previously been considered a county road but that has been laid out, constructed, and maintained with state department of transportation or county funds. (b) A survey is not required of an existing county road that is accepted by resolution by a board of county commissioners.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that a public hearing shall be held the **26th** day of **June, 2023** at **6:30 P.M.** located at **Brockton School Administrative Bldg (Conference Room) in Brockton, Montana;** and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at such a hearing the public is encouraged to offer comment on whether the foregoing described roads should be designated as county roads; and any persons not able to attend the hearing may submit written comments prior to the hearing by sending or delivering such comments to the Roosevelt County Commissioners, Roosevelt County Courthouse, 400 2nd Ave South, Wolf Point, MT 59201; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that notice of the public hearing shall be published in accordance with Section 7-1-2121, Montana Code Annotated.

Gordon called their regular public meeting to order.

MINUTES:

Minutes for the special public meeting of June 6, 2023, were presented for approval. Robert made the motion to approve, and Gary seconded. No discussion. All in favor, motion passed.

Minutes for the Teamster Union Negotiations meeting of June 8, 2023, were presented for approval. Robert made the motion to approve, and Gary seconded. No discussion. All in favor, motion passed.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Bill Juve asked about the special provisions pertaining to the Rodeo Road. Gordon responded that he printed out what came in the email. Robert stated that the Commission would like him to review the information and report back to them by June 28th.

ADMINISTRATIVE ISSUES:

- Action on Transfer of the Picard Pit from Franz to Roosevelt County. Robert made a motion to approve. Gary seconded the motion. Discussion: Gordon stated that Franz was releasing the pit and then the county could contract with Picard. Franz has reclaimed most of the pit, but a couple areas are still open. There is estimated to be around 200,000-300,000 yards left. All voted in favor. The motion passed.
- Action on Retaining Used Grader to be Used in Bainville. Robert made a motion to approve. Gary seconded the motion. Discussion: Gordon stated that there are 5 John Deeres that they were trading in. One new one is already in Williston. The proposal is to retain one of the machines with the fewest hours on it as an additional machine in the Bainville area due to the oil wells and increased truck traffic. Ken stated they have just been hired for the position and should be starting soon. Ken stated that each operator maintains around 120 miles of roadway. By retaining the one machine the amount spent is still within the budget. Gary and Robert both have concerns about whether the utilization of the grader would be justified. Robert commented that if they see the production then all is good if not then the grader can be traded off later. Gordon made the motion to approve, Robert seconded. Gary voted against. Motion passed.
- Resignation from Sheriff's Office Employee Tim Lingle. Robert made a motion to approve. Gary seconded the motion. Gary wanted to thank Tim for his long-time service. Gordon also conveyed his appreciation to Tim as a valued officer and thanked him for his service. All in favor, motion passed.
- Resignation from Health Department Employee Katie MacDonald. Robert made a motion to approve, and Gary seconded. All in favor, motion carried.

Language Change- No functional change to CBA

“Article XIV-Other Leave” changed to Article XIV- Miscellaneous Provisions

This article covers many miscellaneous items; other leave is covered in a previous article.

Addition to Article XIV, Subsection B, added subsection:

1. Annually scheduled meeting with county human resources officer to discuss health plan benefits and options. Meeting will be scheduled during the open enrollment time frame.

County Counteroffer

Compensation:

1 Year- \$1.00 or 4% on base, whichever is higher.

Longevity:

\$9.50 and have to cap it, leave at 25 years.

Language Change:

Agreed with miscellaneous language change.

Additions to Article XIV, Subsection B, added subsection:

County doesn’t have a human resource officer, Tracy in Clerk and Recorder can only talk about pay not insurance plans. Employee would need to talk to the Insurance representative. Adjust language to include members may request through their supervisor an in-person meeting with the health insurance representative to discuss health insurance benefits.

County would like to eliminate Juneteenth as a holiday.

AFSCME Counteroffer

Compensation:

\$2.00 on base wage.

Longevity:

Agreed to \$9.50 and leave at 25 years.

Additions to Article XIV, Subsection B:

Agreed to language change.
